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## LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

# DEAN'S WELCOME

“Our students don't wait to make an impact. They lead from the start with confidence, creativity and a community behind them.”

Western Law graduates lead. In courtrooms and law firms, yes, but also in boardrooms, legislatures, public service and civil society.

We are the only law school in Ontario to admit students after two years of undergraduate study. We made that choice deliberately.

A Western Law degree opens every door it should: to private practice, government, in-house counsel and public interest law. Ninety-five percent of our graduates secure employment upon graduation, well above the national average. Our graduates practise in Toronto, New York, London and beyond. But the measure of a Western Law education is not only where graduates start. It is where they go.

A legal education builds habits of mind that travel far beyond the law. Completeness of thinking. The empathy to hold perspectives not your own. The judgment to anticipate what others miss. At Western Law, every course, every clinic, and every experiential program is designed with those qualities in mind.

Western Law is the only Canadian law school to offer first-year students the opportunity to study corporate law, with advanced courses in securities regulation, corporate finance, commercial transactions, and restructuring to follow. Our business law faculty advise governments, shape regulation and produce scholarship that courts and practitioners rely on.

Our faculty also work at the edges of what law can do. Some study how international criminal justice confronts genocide and war crimes, and how gender shapes that entire enterprise, from the drafting of international treaties to the proceedings of international courts. Others examine private law as a tool for addressing climate change, racial inequality and economic disadvantage, asking whether tort law and unjust enrichment can do work that public law cannot. Some are even following law into outer space.

What connects the boardroom to outer space is the same instinct: the disposition to see what is broken and the conviction to fix it. At Western Law, that is what we mean by an entrepreneurial culture.

Our clinics connect you to real clients and real stakes, in industry, government and communities. Faculty know students by name. Alumni stay engaged long after graduation. The relationships you build here will be among the most valuable of your career.

Our community is among the most diverse in Canadian legal education: almost 50% of students identify as racialized and nearly 20% were born outside Canada. That diversity is not a feature we describe. It is something you experience, in every classroom, every day.

When you arrive, you will belong here. Your success will be ours.

# WHO YOU WILL BECOME AT WESTERN LAW

## 1. Shape your professional identity

Western Law does not produce graduates who fit a mold. From your first year, you are challenged to think critically, advocate rigorously, and develop a clear sense of the professional you intend to be. The peer environment, the faculty relationships, and the culture of high expectation here do not just prepare you for a career. They give you the tools to take initiative, think creatively and lead change.

**The experience you gain at Western Law not only prepares you for your future. It shapes the professional you will become.**

## 2. Learn by doing

Leadership is not learned in a lecture hall. At Western Law, you will develop as a professional through experience — in clinics where the stakes are real, in advocacy exercises where you present your case before judges, and in collaborative projects that demand initiative, judgment and accountability. The skills you build here — managing complexity, navigating ambiguity, and making decisions under pressure — are the skills that define leaders in every field the law touches.

## 3. Connect with community

The leaders Western Law produces do not succeed alone. You will succeed because of the networks and relationships you build here. Your first-year classes serve as the foundation. Your professors become mentors and your classmates become the colleagues, partners and collaborators who will celebrate your successes. The Western Law community is a powerful professional network — and it starts the moment you arrive.

## 4. Be driven by purpose

The leaders Western Law builds understand that a legal education is a powerful tool. How you use your legal education will define the leader you become. Purpose is woven into everything here: in our clinics that serve communities, in our curriculum that asks hard questions, and in our culture that treats ethics as a foundation, not an afterthought. Our graduates enter their careers with a spirit of service, knowing not just what the law does, but what it is for.

**Leaders who understand their purpose do not just enter the profession. They change it for the better with imagination, empathy and foresight.**

## 5. Lead from the start

Western Law graduates enter any number of professions, and a world, that is changing faster than at any point in history. Artificial intelligence, global complexity, technological disruption, shifting economic systems. The leaders this moment demands are analytical, adaptive and bold. That is what three years at Western Law builds: not graduates who are ready to follow, but graduates who are ready to lead: in firms, in courts, in government, in business and in fields that are still being invented.

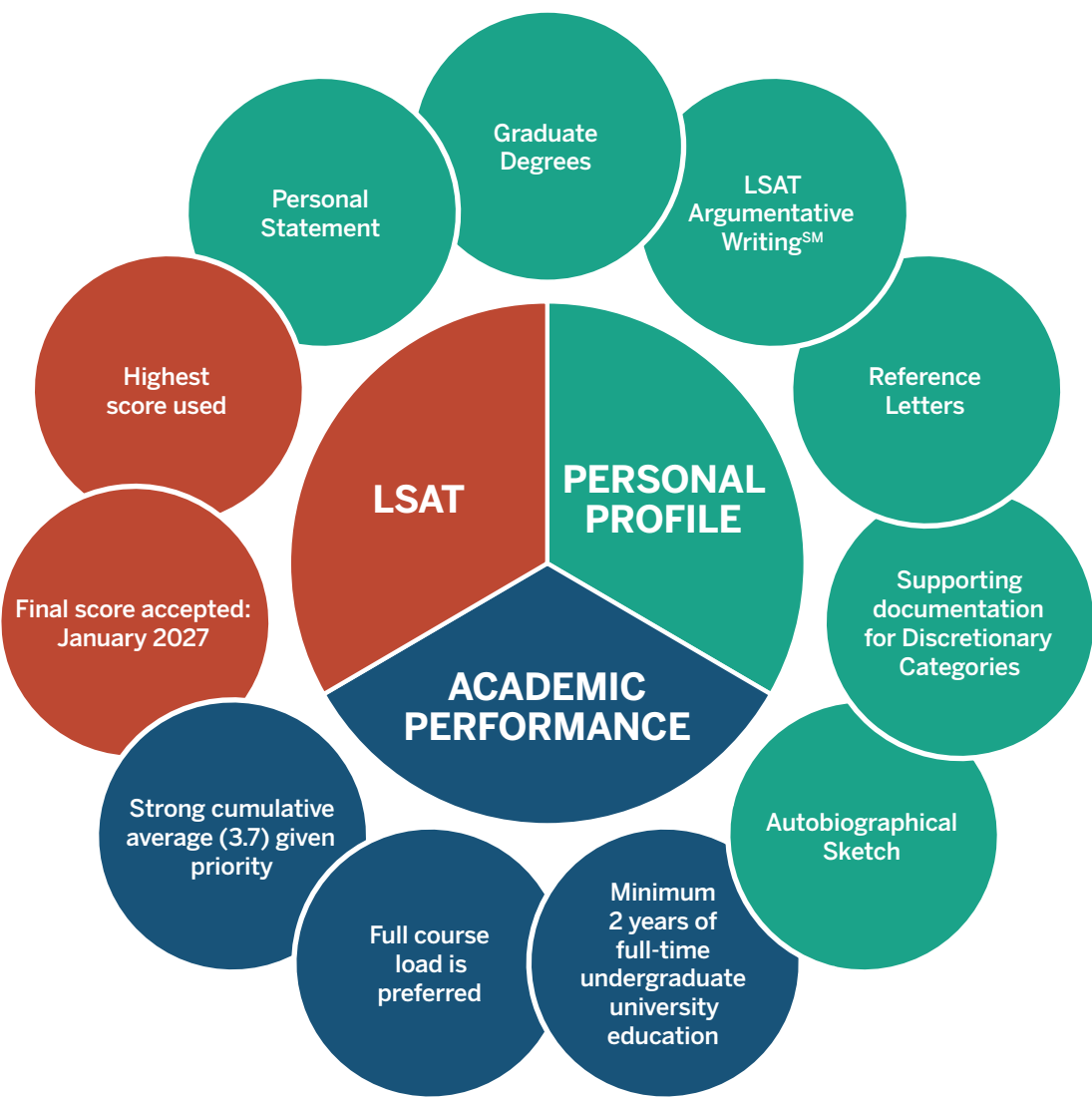

# APPLICANT CATEGORIES

## GENERAL CATEGORY:

Most candidates apply in this category. At least two years of full-time (or equivalent) undergraduate university education is required, although the majority of admitted students will have a four-year degree.

## DISCRETIONARY CATEGORIES:

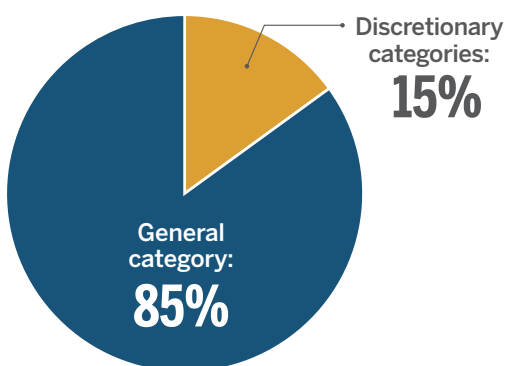
**Access:** You may qualify for this category if your undergraduate academic performance (or LSAT score) was affected by a proven disadvantage, such as cultural, socio-economic, medical or physical barriers, or a learning disability. You must show evidence of potential to succeed at law school (i.e., a minimum of one year of competitive grades).

**Indigenous:** Western Law recognizes that First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Peoples are underrepresented within the legal profession and strongly encourages applications from Indigenous students. As an Indigenous applicant you are required to submit a declaration of Indigenous citizenship or membership to Western's Office of Indigenous Initiatives. Your application will be reviewed holistically.

**Black:** Western Law recognizes that Black individuals are underrepresented within the legal profession and strongly encourages applications from members of this group. You will qualify for this category if you self-identify as a member of the Black community. Your application will be reviewed holistically. Applications are typically assessed by at least one Black reviewer (among 2-3 reviewers).

**Mature:** You will qualify as a mature candidate if you have two or more years of university education, and at least five years of non-university experience since leaving high school. You may provide a resumé as a supplementary document. We will give greater weight to your work and life experience.

# EDIDA

At Western Law we are committed to advancing equity, diversity, inclusion, decolonization and accessibility (EDIDA) and fostering a culture where everyone feels a sense of belonging. Our work is guided by Western Law's EDIDA Committee, the Anti-Racism Working Group recommendations, and Western's Indigenous and EDIDA Strategic Plans.

## REDUCING BARRIERS TO ACCESS

We apply a human rights lens to admissions and work to reduce barriers for students from equity-deserving groups.

### Indigenous applicants

Incoming Indigenous students who complete the University of Saskatchewan Indigenous Law Centre summer program receive credit for Property Law, and we offer funding to help offset program costs. Learn more at [law.uwo.ca/indigenous](http://law.uwo.ca/indigenous)

### Black applicants

Each year, we support five Black undergraduate students with:

- a voucher for the \$200 OUAC fee
- a waiver of Western Law's \$150 application fee
- a Princeton Review LSAT Fundamentals Prep Course (valued at \$1500+)

We also offer a **free LSAT preparation course** every summer for Black, Indigenous, and low-income prospective students, taught by an experienced instructor.

Additional **scholarships, bursaries and awards** are available for incoming Black, Indigenous, and other racialized students.

## Academics, Research and Student Life

Our JD curriculum and research explore areas such as disability law, Indigenous law, gender-based violence, legal issues affecting transgender communities, racial profiling and hate speech.

Students can engage with Western Law's diverse community through clubs including the Black Law Students' Association, Indigenous Students' Organization, Jewish Law Students' Association, Muslim Law Students' Association, OUTLaws, SLS Diversity Committee, Students for Truth and Reconciliation, and Western Women in Law.

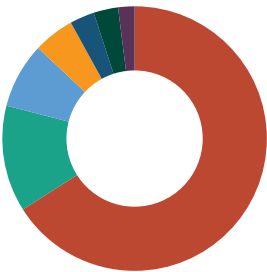

As you move into your upper years, you'll discover a rich mix of courses, hands-on clinical opportunities and immersive learning experiences. You'll complete essay and writing requirements that help you sharpen your research skills and become a stronger, more confident communicator.

Western Law also offers several optional curricular streams designed to help you explore courses and co-curricular activities that match your interests and career goals, and fit the kind of lawyer you want to become.

Western Law offers capstone courses that draw together the theoretical, practical and interdisciplinary dimensions of your JD journey, challenging you to apply your legal knowledge in meaningful, real-world ways. These courses reflect our ongoing commitment to an education that goes beyond doctrine, preparing you to think across disciplines and lead in a changing world.

### Indigenous Peoples and the Law

Our compulsory upper-year Indigenous Peoples and the Law course provides you with an introduction to Aboriginal law, Indigenous legal traditions, Indigenous constitution building, legal pluralism and the relationship between Indigenous peoples and the Crown.

You will examine topics such as: (1) the constitutional rights of Indigenous peoples; (2) the impact of colonial policies on Indigenous legal traditions; (3) the treatment of Indigenous legal traditions by the courts; (4) sources of Indigenous legal traditions; and (5) Anishinaabe constitutionalism. You will also be asked to reflect on the importance of understanding Indigenous legal traditions as a part of your legal education.

Instructors for this course include Professor Jeff Warnock, a citizen of the Métis Nation of Ontario who previously worked as a litigator, as the Senior Public Policy Advisor for the Métis Nation of Ontario and on student programs and diversity outreach initiatives at a large full-service firm.

## Intensive Courses

Western Law offers several week-long two-credit intensive courses during the academic year, which cater to your specific interests in niche areas of law. Examples include Advanced Topics in Securities Law and Practice, Canadian Energy Law, Public Policy, and Energy Transformation (Diversification), Hate Speech in Canada, Cannabis Law and Practice, Condominium Law, and Outer Space Law.

## Global and Intercultural Engagement Honour

This program recognizes your achievements in global and intercultural competencies. Through coursework and extracurricular activities, you will enrich your legal educational experiences and develop the skills you need to succeed and prosper in our increasingly interdependent global society. When successfully completed, the Honour appears on your official Western transcript.

Western Law has established exchange partnerships with 16 leading law schools across four continents: North America, Europe, Asia and Oceania.

Participating in an exchange term allows you to benefit from a broader and more diverse academic and intercultural experience. You will study legal issues from a new perspective through expanded curriculum options, and you will create a network of international contacts for the future.

Each year, Western Law offers over 40 exchange placements, engaging one in five third-year students. Course offerings are available in English at all partner universities (excluding Université Laval).

Experiential learning activities that will ease your transition from legal education to legal practice include:

- Extended simulations of complex litigation files or corporate mergers
- Field trips to courts, government agencies and international organizations
- Clinical opportunities, representing actual clients
- Opportunities to engage with leading scholars, practitioners and judges
- Community engagement projects
- Client and file management
- Externships
- Public legal education
- Applied research projects

## Advocacy Programs

Advocacy is a fundamental skill for aspiring lawyers, which you will develop by preparing written and oral submissions and arguing hypothetical cases before trial and appellate moot courts. This includes receiving comprehensive feedback from practising lawyers and judges.

Upper-year students compete in provincial, national and international advocacy competitions and routinely win awards at these competitions. Multiple areas of legal study are represented in our advocacy program from Constitutional Law, to Corporate Securities, to Family Law.

Western Law students also hone their practice skills in a variety of other competitions.

## Internships

Through our thriving Western Law Internship Program (WLIP), you may intern with international organizations, non-governmental and Indigenous organizations, and private industries.

Since its inception in 2006, WLIP has grown to provide up to 15 internships annually in the areas of international law, environmental law, business and finance law, Indigenous law, access to justice and sport law. Short-listed candidates participate in an interview as part of a competitive selection process.

Internships are 10-12 weeks and occur between May and the beginning of August. Interns receive a stipend to assist with costs associated with the internship, such as travel, visas and cost of living.



# LEGAL CLINICS AND SERVICES

**Community Legal Services (CLS)** is a leader in the cause of access to justice. Our clinic provides free legal services to low-income people in the London community and to Western University students. Working at CLS provides you with insight into the real-life practice of law. Under the close supervision of expert staff lawyers, you handle all aspects of legal cases, including interviewing clients, drafting pleadings, motions and other legal documents, negotiating with opposing parties, conducting legal research, drafting legal opinion letters, and conducting court appearances, hearings and trials. Upper-year students handle cases in the areas of:

- Criminal law
- Provincial offences
- Civil / Small Claims Court
- Family law
- Landlord and tenant

Students also work on Public Legal Education projects and presentations for the community at large.

In first year, you may apply to volunteer at the clinic as an associate caseworker. Associate caseworkers gain practical experience by assisting with Public Legal Education and shadowing upper-year caseworkers on client files. This may include attending client interviews, court appearances and class discussions.

In addition to volunteer roles, there are also opportunities for students to be involved with CLS through clinical courses and to receive formal academic credit in second and third year. Furthermore, CLS hires several students to manage clinic files during the summer months. Those students become mentors to incoming students during the following academic year.

CLS proudly celebrated its 56th anniversary in 2025 and has served over 25,000 clients since its inception.

Western Law offers students numerous opportunities to develop practical skills and gain valuable hands-on legal experience.

**The Western Intellectual Property & Innovation Legal Clinic** offers a unique experiential learning opportunity for you to develop your professional skills while gaining exposure to a wide range of matters relating to intellectual property (IP) rights, privacy and technology law, under the supervision of external IP lawyers. You will collaborate with authors, artists, inventors, entrepreneurs and start-ups in southwestern Ontario to help them protect their intangible assets.

### Pro Bono Students

**Canada** is a national program. As a law student volunteer, you will be matched with community agencies that need legal services but cannot afford them. You will conduct legal research, participate in placements, or complete other law-related projects for local organizations under the supervision of a lawyer mentor.



**The Western Business Law Clinic** provides small start-up and early-stage businesses with student legal assistance overseen by practising lawyers who act as mentors. The clinic allows you to learn valuable practical skills and gain exposure to a wide range of legal matters while providing a benefit to local businesses.

**The Sport Solution Clinic** is the only program of its kind in North America. It offers the unique opportunity to gain experiences working in sports law by assisting high-performance athletes with sport-related legal issues such as NSO athlete agreements, carding, team selection and safe sport matters, in addition to disputes at the Sport Dispute Resolution Centre of Canada. The clinic is run as a program in conjunction with AthletesCAN, the association of Canada's National Olympic and Paralympic Athletes.

**The Dispute Resolution Centre** is a program that provides you with hands-on training in developing mediation skills. You will meet regularly to participate in mock mediations with expert coaching by a lawyer. Once trained, you will provide mediation and conflict-resolution skills to members of the local community and to students at Western University.

**Legal Information for Sexual Assault (LISA)** provides free and confidential legal information to members of the public who have experienced sexual assault or abuse. LISA offers you the opportunity to work under the supervision of a sexual assault lawyer to help survivors understand the legal pathways they may wish to pursue. Clients can meet with a trained law student to discuss their legal options, understand various legal processes and receive information and referrals to legal and non-legal resources.

## The Business Law Advantage

Our curriculum offers a wide range of courses examining the fundamentals of business organizations, finance, securities, mergers and acquisitions, trade and taxation, as well as leading-edge topics in mining and energy law, and environmental, social and corporate governance.

In addition to renowned full-time faculty, our visiting professors and speakers' programs allow you to learn from pre-eminent lawyers, economists and leaders in the business and public sectors. Since 2007, we have hosted more than 30 of the world's foremost scholars in business and law from the world's top universities, including several Nobel laureates.

We also provide numerous opportunities for you to gain real-world experience through our Business Law Clinic, business-related advocacy competitions and summer internships.

## Western Law and the Ivey Business School

### The HBA/JD

Each year we set aside a number of places in our first-year class for high achievers in the Ivey Business School Honours Business Administration program. Students apply at the end of their third year of study (HBA1) and complete the first year of law school in Year 4 of the combined program. Years 5 and 6 consist of an approved mix of required and elective courses from both faculties.

### The JD/MBA

The JD/MBA program provides an exceptional education for highly motivated, talented students capable of managing the demands of two intensive programs. Students in this program, who are expected to have at least two years of quality work experience, begin with the business essentials component of the MBA in January before first-year law.



# WESTERN LAW - UNIVERSITY OF BRISTOL PATHWAY

Western Law and the University of Bristol Law School have partnered to create a transatlantic pathway that allows Bristol LLB graduates to complete a Juris Doctor (JD) at Western Law in two years - earning two law degrees from two leading institutions and positioning themselves for careers across sectors in Canada and around the world.

## Advantages include:

- earning an LLB from the University of Bristol and a JD from Western Law in five years
- qualifying directly for bar admission in Canadian provinces, without the NCA assessment process that applies to other internationally trained lawyers
- working with the Career and Professional Development Office at Western Law for support in securing an articling position
- joining a cohort of Western Law students at one of Canada's leading law schools, where spaces are reserved for Bristol graduates each year

# FINANCING YOUR LEGAL EDUCATION

We are committed to ensuring our JD students have access to adequate financial resources. In 2024/25, 40 per cent of Western Law students received 1.6 million dollars in bursaries, awards and scholarships. Funding is provided to you through various forms of financial assistance.

**Merit-based scholarships** recognize and reward students for excellent academic achievement. These include Dean of Law entrance scholarships in amounts up to \$50,000 and named entrance scholarships.

Criteria for entrance scholarships may also include financial need, extra-curricular activities, leadership, entrepreneurship and public service. Separate applications are not required for any of these scholarships.

**Need-based funding** (bursaries, awards and work study) is distributed to students on the basis of demonstrated financial need.

The Torys LLP Student Support Bursary Program provided an additional \$400,000 in funding to Western Law students beginning in the fall of 2020.
